What Happened at Our April Meeting?

Oroville Piecemakers hosted the Spring meeting of Quilt Guilds of the North Quarter. The meeting was held at the Palermo Grange and saw 57 guild members and representatives enjoying a day with like-minded people. Guilds from Oroville, Woodland, Chico, Paradise, Sutter, Yuba City, Colusa, Sutter, Willows, Red Bluff, Orland, Chester, Tuleville, McArthur, Hayfork, St. Lilly, Crescent City, North Carolina, Anderson and Redding

For lunch we enjoyed soups and salads with rolls and French bread, plus desserts. Yum ladies! Everyone was given a cupcake made from fabric. So cute! There were raffle baskets and beautiful opportunity quilts from Paradise, Chico, Oroville and Woodland. After announcements of Quilt shows, events and speakers a question was asked about filings that needed to go into the state of California and the IRS for non-profit organizations. This prompted a lively discussion.

Linda Brown sent this information for us:

(First off, Janet Carver also asked for this information, but I have misplaced her email address. I would appreciate it if you would pass it on to her.) Hey Janet! Here it is!!

Our fiscal year is July 1 to June 30 --

We file annually sales taxes on the funds we collect from Boutique sales and Treasure Table sales during the year and at special events. We extrapolate the number from the sale...so sales tax is included in the price. Due to our fiscal year we are required to file no later than July 31st each year.

The State has recently updated their reporting and their fiscal year for Charities and Raffles.

Annually we file the RR-1 form that registers (with a fee, I think \$25 last year, maybe \$30) our 501c3 charity existence which includes our most recent financial report.

For holding a raffle, we first have to file annually (kind of a permission with a fee) the dates of our raffle, our Opportunity Quilt. That form is NRP-1

Then we need to file a NRP-2 on the raffle receipts from the previous year, that needs to be filed no later than October 1.

However, in early April, the Dept of Justice/Attorney General office amended the fiscal year from Sept 1 - Aug 31 to for this year be extended to Dec 31. Afterwards the new fiscal year for everyone as far as Raffles is concerned will be the calendar year Jan 1 - Dec 31.

Then you either need an IRS form 990 OR a Calif form CT-TR-1 form which is the Treasurer's report for the year. Electronically filing the IRS form cost \$\$, the CT-TR-1 does not.

I think that is a quick synopsis. If you are initially applying to hold a raffle, there is a form for that and you have to have been a charity for at least a year before you can. All this so we can make a little money to support our community service/charity work.

Then the Sue Good asked Annie's Star Treasurer to send information also. Linda Austin sent the forms with their instructions that need to be filed. Thank you Linda II. I tried to copy and paste them to this newsletter but they did not cooperate. However here is where and what you can look for on line:

1. Go to the State of California Department of Justice
2. Look for the Raffle Registration Checklist
3. Now pull up the Nonprofit Raffle Report form (4 pages long. Includes 2 pages of instructions)

We also had a great trunk show from a member of the Piecemakers. She's an explosives Chemist! It was a great collection of her quilting experience divided into four distinct genres. This quilter is looking to "go on the road" with her presentation. I Don't Have Her Name. Oh NO!!! I'm so sorry BUT we will have it by the meeting.

Ocean Wave Quilters of Fort Bragg

Well, we survived another Quilt Show. (Put next year's dates – June 29-30 – on your calendar!) It sure seems like it gets to be more and more work every year... guess that may have something to do with us getting older, huh? (Nooooo! It can't be!!) But this year we actually had a lot of new (and younger - YAY!) members jumping in to help out. Set-up went about as smoothly as it could have, thanks to Becky Bright and her team. We had to work around the Elementary School's Community Breakfast and Lunch program again this year (they provide meals to any kids under 18 in the community who want them) as well as summer school, but honestly you never would have known anything was going on! The school staff was amazing. We were done within our planned number of hours both on set-up day and on judging day, and the show opened on time on Saturday morning. The weather wasn't terribly cooperative – we hoped the sun would at least make an appearance, but June Gloom continued, making it a little challenging for the Class of 2026 Parents' Club to get warm in their lunch booth. This was the first time they have provided lunch for our show – they set up a Baked Potato Bar and a salad bar along with hot dogs, chips, and drinks. Attendees at our show seemed to really appreciate that there was an option for lunch. (The elementary school is a mile East of town, so the restaurants along Highway 1 are just a little too far away for some folks. Providing a food choice has been the number one request each year on our exit survey.) Too bad the sun didn't warm things up just a bit to make sitting outdoors a little more comfortable.

We had more than 400 paying attendees... not bad since we are still recovering from those two years when we couldn't have a show due to the pandemic. And our sponsorships were up from last year. Our Quilt Walk through the downtown area was very successful this year due to Sherry Waggoner's leadership and the hard work of her committee – more than 90 quilts were hung in local merchants, the library and the hospital. They looked fabulous! Lots of positive community comments about how great it was to see quilts everywhere. I especially appreciated the display at the hospital's registration area... so nice to walk in and see colorful quilts on the walls; makes having to visit there much less sterile. Our judges were Kitty Oliver and Lynda Lasich, and the process went very smoothly, again thanks to leadership by Daisy Woodhams and her great team of scribes. Interestingly, while most years there is a clear-cut front-runner in the "Viewer's Choice" award (attendees vote for their favorite quilt, with one quilt usually getting scores of votes), this year, the most votes any quilt received was less than 20 – voting was wide-spread across lots of the entries, with lots and lots of quilts getting just a handful of votes! I guess that means there was something for everyone!

My husband and I were VIP judges (as 2019 Featured Artists, we would ordinarily have done that job in 2020, but there was no show). I have to say, I have never had a more difficult job than picking my "favorite" quilt out of the whole show! So many beautiful, interesting, and varied entries. The other VIP judges (president of our local hospital, principal of the elementary school, two local business owners, the head librarian) agreed. We had a great Featured Artist in our member, Carole Poma, who does intricate thread painting, raw-edge applique, and whole cloth free-motion quilting. A vintage quilt on display from 1860 was very popular, as was a display of fund-raising quilts from the local town of Comptche. And we were privileged to have a special exhibit of 100 small (12" x 12") quilts from SAQA (Studio Art Quilt Associates) fund-raisers collected by member Sue Arnold over the years. These were made by quilt artists around the world and were just stunning! Our vendors this year included a scissors sharpener, who was very popular. (How did I accumulate so many pairs of scissors? But now they're sharp!)

A big thanks to Paula Perelstein who, in addition to owning and running Sew 'n Sew, our local fabric store, was this year's Show Chair. Sherry Waggoner will take over for 2024; her challenge will be that a number of long-time committee chairs are retiring their positions; some are moving from the area, others have medical issues that require them to take a sabbatical; others are just plain worn out! So, we're hoping our membership steps up to fill these roles and bring new and exciting ideas for next year's show.

We're all now in recovery mode, trying to put our sewing rooms and studios back into some kind of order. And thinking about what we would improve for next year. Our 2024 Opportunity Quilts are done and going to be set up outside Headlands Coffee House this weekend to begin ticket sales. I'm excited to see how well our smaller quilt does this year – we selected a "Happy, Scrappy Houses" pattern by Bonnie Hunter which features "wonky" houses. Most of our membership is more "old school" than that... they don't usually do "wonky". But we actually got 40 blocks turned in with lots of varied fabric from everyone's stash – enough to make the quilt 2-sided!! And we then decided, since people had put fun "surprises" in the windows of their "wonky" houses (like cats, bears, hedgehogs, etc.), to turn it into an "I Spy with my Little Eye" quilt, putting clues in the sashing to find the fun things in the windows. It turned out really cute, and we're hoping it will be popular! (Let me know if you'd like to buy tickets!)

After we all recover from the show, our next guild project will be our October retreat. Then, we'll start gearing up for our holiday pillowcase donations to foster youth and to local shelters helping families fleeing from domestic violence; our goal is to donate over 100 pillowcases each year, along with our other community projects.

We hope you all stay cool this summer! Come on over to the Coast... we seem to be able to guarantee cool weather these days!
